- **Course Description:** This course will offer you opportunities to develop proficiency in modern Japanese at the intermediate level. Our emphasis is on linguistic competency in four components; listening, speaking, reading and writing. There is, however, another important feature of language, which is the knowledge and understanding of the target culture. The instructor will introduce and explain new expressions and grammar patterns, give you the opportunities to practice them, and help you learn Japanese in daily situations within cultural and social contexts. You will gradually gain higher communicative competency in the Japanese language as a whole. This course will cover from Lesson 19 to 23 of "Genki" textbook.
 - This course is certified for the SAS Core Curriculum and can be used to meet an Areas of Inquiry goal: Understand the nature of human languages and their speakers. (SAS Core Code is AHq.)
 - This course is designed for those who have completed Japanese 201. If you have taken Japanese of this level at a different university, you must see the instructor immediately regarding placement.

Course Objectives:

At the end of the course students will be expected to perform in all four skills — speaking, listening, reading and writing — at an intermediate level of proficiency. More precisely, students will be able to:

- read and write about 80 more kanji.
- understand complex sentence structures.
- use accurate and contextually appropriate forms of language, especially honorific and humble forms of Japanese.
- understand and use passive, causative, and causative passive sentences.
- make conditional statements with various expressions.
- ask favors and permissions and to make questions with more natural and politer ways.
- deepen your understanding of Japanese culture, lifestyle, and customs such as educational system and religion.

Participation:

- You are expected to voluntarily ask and answer the questions, present your own ideas, and discuss with the classmates and the instructor. In order to participate actively with accuracy and fluency, you are expected to read the textbook and learn the vocabulary before coming to class. Make sure to review constantly, going back to the earlier lessons frequently.
- Your participation in the Language Table, *Tadoku* program, and office hours will be also considered as a part of your active participation. By participating them five times or more combined, you will be given 2 extra percent. (However, 5% is the maximum for your participation grade.)

Assignments:

- Workbook assignments are regularly assigned. (See Schedule.) There will be additional assignments from time to time.
- Your <u>completed</u> homework should be turned in <u>at the beginning of class on the due</u> <u>date</u> to be accepted for full credit. Those submitted later but before the next class starts will earn <u>half</u> of the credit. Those submitted on the following class will earn only <u>one fourth</u> of the credit. Any assignments submitted after that will not be accepted. If you cannot submit your homework because of your absence, you may submit it at the beginning of the next class and get full credit.
- Papers containing many errors and/or blanks must be re-submitted to get credit.
- Please use a pencil and an eraser, not a pen.

Reading:

• There will be one reading assignments. You will practice reading「マリアさんのメール」(pp.321), record your reading, and submit the best one, as you did in the previous years. The due date is Sunday, February 16.

Composition:

- There will be one composition assignment. You will be asked to write two-page composition in Japanese. The due date is <u>April 2</u>.
- Other details will be explained in class.

Quizzes:

- There will be fourteen quizzes. (See Schedule.)
- If you are late to class, you won't be given extra time to complete the quizzes.

Lesson Tests:

- There will be three end-of-lesson tests: Lesson 19, 20, and 22. Lesson 21 and 23 will be included in the midterm and final exam respectively.
- If you are late to class, you will not be given extra time to complete the tests.
- If you miss a test/quiz, you should arrange the time and place for the make-up as soon as possible. Please note that you cannot get 100% of what you make, if you take a make-up test/quiz after the scheduled time.

Presentation:

• There will be two presentations. The first presentation is a skit with your partner, scheduled on <u>February 26</u>. The other one is scheduled on <u>April 27</u> and you will introduce someone to your classmates.

• Other details will be announced later in class.

Oral Exam:

- An oral examination is scheduled at the end of the semester. It will be approximately for 7 minutes per student.
- Details will be explained in class before the exam.

Midterm Exam & Final Exam:

- The midterm exam will be held in the regular class period, and the final exam will be held according to the University schedule. You must take them on the days scheduled.

- If you are late to class, you won't be given extra time to complete the exams.
